



Tracing 1,000 Years of Jewish History in Poland

The North American Council of the Museum of the History of Polish Jews is the primary U.S. tax-exempt charitable organization supporting the design and creation of the permanent exhibition devoted to the long and rich history of Polish Jewry. It follows the Jewish presence from the time the Jews came to Poland at the turn of the 11th Century to the present.

The North American Council is the main channel for Museum development activities in North America. It also supports efforts to restore and enhance the awareness of the flowering of Jewish religious and secular life, Yiddish culture, communal life and political activity in Poland in the course of centuries.

The Museum in Warsaw will trace 1000 years of Jewish life in Poland. Its stunning architectural design alludes to the parting of the Red Sea from the time of the Jewish Exodus from Egypt to the Promised Land.

In the Museum of the History of Polish Jews we want to restore the memory ... of the Polish Jewish world. This will be a unique tour and perception of the traces left by many generations of Jews who lived among us.

The spatial plan of the museum links the past with the present. This visualization of the main entrance looks out on the plaza between the Museum building and the Monument to the Heroes of the Warsaw Ghetto. The central hall symbolically represents the parting of the Red Sea and the passage of Jews through history. The monument by Nathan Rapaport, the homage to Jewish tragedy and resistance, looks into the Museum building that enfolds a storied past and the pride of Jewish presence in Poland.

The Museum of the History of Polish Jews will open on the 70th Anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising.

For whom is our Museum intended?

First, for the Jews of the whole world, especially Jewish youth, so that they can learn their roots in history; to make them aware that for a long period the majority of the Jewish diaspora lived on Polish soil; so that they realize that on this soil were born all their great spiritual movements - both religious, such as Hasidism, as well as secular, such as Bundism and Zionism.

Second, for the Polish people, especially Polish youth, so they will understand that for nearly 1000 years the Jews were part of the Polish landscape - as Polish literature and history attests - until a vacuum was formed by the Holocaust, which it is the mission of our Museum to fill.

Third, for all who are neither Jews nor Poles, so that they might appreciate the enormous contribution Polish Jews have made to European and world civilization.
